


Mr. Gabriel






IF YOU AREN'T WATCHING, YOU SHOULD BE...


GUESS THE TEACHER

GREAT THINGS ARE HAPPENING AT CA

Through the PA Smart Grant, Carbondale Area was awarded \$35,000 to enhance their STEM education program. Through the grant we have been able to establish a makerspace within our high school. The space is meant to be a space for all teachers to use to incorporate 21st century skills into their lessons. In the makerspace, there is a Glowforge laser engraver, several 3D printers, 3D Doodler pens, and a variety of different maker bots and coding tools.

The hope is that teachers work cooperatively

and begin to implement assignments across the curriculum which will allow students to take advantage of the makerspace and its equipment.









Breakfast: Good Old-Fashioned Pancakes

Prep: 5 mins Cook: 15 mins Total: 20 mins Servings: 8 Yield: 8 servings

Ingredients:

1½ cups all-purpose flour 3 ½ teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon white sugar

1 ¼ cups milk

1 egg

3 tablespoons butter, melted

Step 1: In a large bowl, sift together the flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar. Make a well in the center and pour in the milk, egg, and melted butter; mix until smooth.

Step 2: Heat a lightly oiled griddle or frying pan over medium-high heat. Pour or scoop the batter onto the griddle, using 1/4 cup for each pancake. Brown on both sides and serve hot.



Snack: Blueberry Cornbread in A Skillet

Prep: 20 mins Cook: 30mins Total: 50 mins Servings: 10

Yield: 19-inch skillet bread

Ingredients

3 tablespoons vegetable oil. 1 cup frozen sweet corn kernel.

1 cup fresh blueberry.

2 tablespoons vegetable oil.

1 cup corn meal.

1 cup all-purpose flour.

½ cup of white sugar.

1 teaspoon salt.

1 cup of butter milk.

½ unsalted butter melted and

cooled.

2 large eggs.

2 teaspoons baking powder.

Step 1: Pour vegetable oil into a 9inch cast iron skillet and place skillet in the center of the oven, preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C).

Step 2: While the oven is preheating, place corn in a microwave safe bowl, cover and microwave on high for 2 ½ minutes, stirring halfway through place corning colander to drain any excess liquid, then transfer to a medium bowl. Add blueberries and 2 tablespoons flour and toss to combine set aside. pick inserted into the center

Step 3: Combine cornmeal, 1 cup flour, sugar baking powder and salt in a large bowl

Step 4: Whisk buttermilk melted butter and eggs together in a small

bowl. Pour into the cornmeal flour mixture and mix and combine. Gentilly fold in the reserved blueberry cornmeal mixture.

Step 5: Remove skillet from the oven and brush the oil onto the bottom and slide until coated. Pour batter into the hot skillet and level the top with a spatula.

Step 6: Bake in the preheated oven until golden brown and a toothcomes out clean, 25 to 30 minutes. Serve warm.

Ingredients

3 cups diced peeled potatoes.

4 slices of bacon.

1 small union diced.

¼ cup white vinegar.

2 tablespoons water.

3 tablespoons white sugar.

1 teaspoon of salt.

1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper.

1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley.

Directions


Step 1: Place potatoes into a pot and fill with enough water to cover. Bring to a boil and cook for about 10 minutes, or until easily

pierced with a fork. Drain, and set aside to cool

Step 2: Place the bacon in a large deep skillet over medium-high heat. Fry until browned and crisp, turning as needed. Remove from the pan and set aside.

Step 3: Add onion to the bacon grease and cook over medium heat until browned. Add the vinegar, water, sugar, salt, and pepper to the pan. Bring to a boil, then add the potatoes and parsley. Crumble in half of the bacon. Heat through, then transfer to a serving dish. Crumble the remaining bacon over the top and serve warm.

Teriyaki Rib Eye Steaks

Ingredients

2 tablespoons soy sauce

2 tablespoons water

1 tablespoon white sugar

1 ½ teaspoons honey

1 ½ teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

1 1/4 teaspoons distilled white vinegar

1 teaspoon olive oil

¼ teaspoon onion powder

¼ teaspoon garlic powder

1/8 teaspoon ground ginger

2 (6 ounce) lean beef rib eye steaks

Directions

Step 1: Whisk together the soy sauce, water, sugar, honey, Worcestershire sauce, vinegar, olive oil, onion powder, garlic powder, and ground ginger in a large bowl. Pierce steaks several times with a fork. Marinate steaks in soy sauce mixture for at least 2 hours.

Step 2: Cook the steaks in a hot skillet, wok, or hibachi over medium heat; 7 minutes per side for medium. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read 140 degrees F (60 degrees C).

Stuffed Shells with Spinach: Ingredients for the filling:

1(12oz) package jumbo shell 1 large egg 1(16 oz) container ricotta

1(16 oz) container ricotta 2 c shredded mozzarella, divided 3/4c freshly grated parmesan pecorino divided

1(16 oz) package frozen spinach, thawed and squeezed dry

34 tsp kosher salt

1 clove garlic

1 tsp fresh thyme leaves

¼ tsp freshly grated nutmeg

1/4 tsp freshly ground black pepper

1/4 crushed red pepper flakes 1/2 tsp lemon zest

Ingredients for the sauce:

2 tbsp, extra-virgin olive oil 6 cloves garlic, smashed ¼ tsp, freshly grated nutmeg 4 cups of Marinara

1 tsp granulated sugar

Directions

- 1. Cook pasta shells according to package directions until al dente, 6 to 7 minutes. Drain immediately and shake dry completely.
- 2. In a large bowl, stir together egg, ricotta 1 ¼ cup mozzarella, a ½ parmesan, spinach, thyme, nutmeg, pepper, red pepper flakes, lemon zest, salt, and garlic until smooth. Transfer to the refrigerator until ready for use.
- 3. Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees. In a large ovenproof skillet over medium heat, heat oil. Add garlic and cook until lightly Golden, stirring occasionally for about 3 minutes. Add nutmeg and stir until fragrant, for 30 seconds. Add marinara to another bowl. Spread remaining 1 cup marinara evenly across the

skillet.

- 4. Fill pasta shells with 1 table-spoon ricotta mixture each and place in the skillet. spread remaining sauce over top. Top with remaining ½ cup mozzarella and 2 tablespoon parmesan.
- 5. Bake covered loosely, until cheese is melted, about 30 minutes. Remove foil, then bake until cheese begins to turn golden, about 10 minutes
- 6. Garnish remaining parmesan, nutmeg, and herbs before serving.



Instant Pot Chicken and Rice:

Ingredients:

1 tsp, extra virgin olive oil ½ yellow onion, chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced 1 tsp, dried oregano 1 tsp, smoked paprika 1c. White rice Kosher salt

Directions:

- 1. Preheat instant pot by setting to "sauté", add oil and cook onion until it is softened, 3 to 4 minutes. Add garlic, oregano, and paprika and cook until fragrant, 1 minute.
- 2. Stir in rice and broth and season until salt and pep-

per, add carrots, bell pepper, chicken, and season generously again with salt and pepper.

3. Close lid, change setting to manual or "pressure cook" and set for 8 minutes on high. When 8 minutes is up, let pot decompress naturally for 10 minutes, then release pressure, remove lid, and shred chicken. Top with parsley before serving.






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
