The Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) recognizes the extraordinary efforts made by Local Education Agencies (LEAs), schools, and educators to support students during the COVID-19 pandemic. 	Methods Used to Understand Each Type of Impact
Academic Impact of Lost Instructional Time	ESSER funding will be allocated to address the impact of Covid 19 pandemic learning loss among our K-12 grade student population. We have selected several targeted areas of literacy intervention to address the individual needs fo students and to be proactive in supporting our educators and families. We plan to purchase a new reading series that provides us with cross-curricular approach encompassing multiple content areas. We also plan to offer after school tutoring programs to assist targeted needs of intervention in the areas of Math, Science and ELA. The increased regression among students who have already been identified as needing additional supports, for example our special education population 26-30% of the District as well as students who are below grade level benchmarks will be provided with individualized remediation. Our curriculum, after school programs, WIN (What I need) Intervention time and Tiered interventions will assist us in bridging the knowledge gaps due to COVID 19.
Chronic Absenteeism	Based on the PA Futures Ready Index Data collected, absenteeism is a targeted area of improvement in our comprehensive planning and building instructional improvment plans. We will start by surveying students/parents to identify reason(s) for student absenteeism or truancy. We will incorporate this data into our monthly MTSS meetings and from there align our families with resources to assist them. (transportation, counseling, tiered intervention etc.) We plan to offer monthly staff and student initiatives to help address this area of need.
Student Engagement	When students become active participants in the classroom, we not only meet their academic needs but we address behaviors and cognitive understanding. We have planned staff book talks, professional development and monthly parent initiatives to target.
Social-emotional Well- being	We believe this area of targeted intervention has never been more important as we return to school during a Global Pandemic. We plan to address mental health needs of our students by identifying areas of concern using a Social-Emotional targeted intervention screener. We also have planned to incorporate daily yoga and mindfulness sessions. Staff professional development is planned around building resiliency and restorative best practices to address any behavorial concerns we may experience.
Other Indicators	Trauma Informed School Intiative Staff professional development regarding trauma, resiliency, best practices is needed to meet the mental health needs of our student population and community. We plan to train our administrative team to help build a train the trainer model within each building.

The District regularly engages teachers, students, other administrators and the parents of the PTA in order to select the best and most effective curriculum and programs to use the ESSER monies. The Districts website will be used to inform the community of what the District is doing curriculum wise. The District Safety procedures will be continuously updated as needed based on recommendations from the Centers For Disease Control(CDC) and the Pennsylvania Dept of Health.

Parents, District employees ,students, community members will be offered a survey to help the District determine what to prioritize with potential ESSER III fund. Data has shown that the pandemic has had a significant impact on student learning in many cases in both the Carbondale Area School District and across the country.

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The District will take its existing test scores and modify as much as possible the new curriculum to address the areas of extreme weakness given the Districts high percentage of Socially and Economically disadvantages population and put the resources to those areas. The new textbook series was specially selected due to its use with students with high learning loss and from poorer Districts. Evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning, extended day comprehensive after school programs, or extended school year programs; and Ensure interventions respond to students' academic, social, emotional and mental health needs and address the disproportionate impact of coronavirus on student populations as defined in ESEA, Title I, Part A, students experiencing homelessness, students with disabilities, migratory students and youth in foster care. There were and we will continue to make technology purchases to get as many students with 1 To 1 Technology as possible.

The District Continuity of Service included a full reopening for the 2021-22 school year and is excited to have kids back for in person learning. Funds are earmarked to maintain existing positions to avoid teacher layoffs that occurred in the 18-19 school year. To combat absenteeism, the truant officer would make calls to families and for students in our cyber academy the teacher has in person on line interaction and he takes roll to ensure students are logged on to participate in the class. In regards to the Facilities improvements, The District has asked for \$1.5 million of this ESSER III grant if awarded to put full air conditioning in the elementary school which does not currently have air conditioning in the classroom wings of the school. The Districts Health and Safety Plan is posted on the Districts website and is constantly reviewed to have the latest safety techniques and guidance from CDC and the PA Dept of Health.
