- -Financial assistance program to schools to improve educational opportunities for educationally deprived children
- -Meant for schools with a high percentage of poor children
- -CASD is around 62% Economically Disadvantaged
- -School-wide vs. Targeted Title I
- -Targeted: schools with less than 40% Economically Disadvantaged---then, it's just for selected children
- -School-wide: the entire program of the school, support the entire school, not just select children
- -Money received: Range of approximately \$700,000-850,000
- -Spent mostly on salaries to assist with class size; could be offering parenting classes, buying books to support literacy, professional development, etc.

- -Goal- Prior to graduation, all high school students will chart their own personalized pathway for a future career inclusive of the necessary skills, training and/or college degree necessary for achieving their post-secondary vision and plan.
- -Offer flexible scheduling and coursework aimed towards their career pathway.
- -Field Trips, AMP Program (Manufacturing)- pre-apprenticeship program to create awareness about manufacturing employment career pathways- technicians responsible for programming, monitoring, and repairing high-tech machines, Geisinger AIM High Program (Careers in Health Care)- live workshop focused on diverse healthcare-related career areas- could be nursing, rehab, radiology, etc.

- -Core group of teachers taking the course at secondary as part of the reading initiative.
 - B. Elementary
 - i. STEM Lab Grades 1-4, Art
- Changed from K having it to 4th Grade to assist with covering PSSA content better
- Across the nation, many students do not have access to arts education. We added it last school year.
- -Important in helping children with the development of motor skills, language skills, social skills, decision-making, risk-taking and creativity. Not to mention visual arts teach learners about color, layout, perspective and balance.
 - ii. Yoga- Social-Emotional Wellness
- -Instructor has lesson plans and the program is designed to dive into the physiological framework of trauma, how it manifests in the mind and body, and how to identify and address symptoms of trauma, including anxiety, depression, behavioral issues, relationship stress and health issues.
- -Goal: equip students with the confidence, skills, and tools to feel safe, empowered, and self-regulated.
 - iii. Goal- Swimming by 2023-2024 as part of PE at elementary school
 - iv. CKLA
- Third grade students studied Classic Tales in Unit 1 of the CKLA program. They read the following classic tales: *The Wind in the Willows, Aladdin and the Wonderful Lamp, and Alice's Adventures in Wonderland.* Throughout this unit, students learned many new advanced vocabulary words that they can now use appropriately in everyday language. They have learned to use words such as dejected, meandered, summoned, forage, personification, dialogue, and narration, just to name a few. Throughout this unit, students were able to compare and contrast characters from their stories, identify

the author's purpose for writing a story, and write a detailed paragraph explaining how a character demonstrated irresponsible qualities in the story. As a culminating activity for Unit 1, we celebrated students' efforts and learning by recreating the tea party from *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*. During our tea party, students enjoyed tea and "crumpets", supplied by our food service provide, The Nutrition Group, Inc.
